Capital Credits Retired

In 2024, the Todd-Wadena Electric Cooperative (TWEC) Board of Directors approved a capital credit retirement that totals **\$534,000**. TWEC is retiring *\$298,000* to members active in *2009*; and Great River Energy, our wholesale energy provider, is retiring *\$236,000* of capital credits that will be refunded to TWEC members who had patronage from *1997-2003*.

Active members: if you were a member of TWEC during the years listed above, your capital credits were applied to your account as an *energy credit* on your December bill.

At Todd-Wadena Electric Cooperative (TWEC) our mission is to deliver reliable and affordable electricity to our members. However, with upcoming power cost increases from our wholesale suppliers, Great River Energy (GRE) and Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), the TWEC Board of Directors approved the implementation of a Power Cost Adjustment (PCA) during the November board meeting. The PCA will take effect on January 1, 2025, and will first appear on February billing statements for members with general service, three-phase, and large power accounts.

While TWEC has worked diligently to absorb as much of the increased costs as possible by keeping controllable expenses tight, these unavoidable increases cannot be fully absorbed without compromising our financial stability.

Upcoming Rate Changes and Investments in Reliable Energy

Both of Todd-Wadena Electric Cooperative's (TWEC) wholesale power suppliers, Great River Energy (GRE) and Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), have announced rate increases for 2025. These adjustments reflect strategic investments aimed at improving grid reliability, supporting mandated renewable energy, and ensuring financial stability.

Great River Energy (GRE)

Great River Energy, TWEC's primary wholesale power provider, is budgeting approximately \$1.1 billion in revenue and expenses for 2025. This budget supports GRE's operational needs and funds critical investments in the electric grid. One major initiative involves the buildout of high-voltage transmission lines to reduce congestion and create pathways for increased integration of state mandated renewable energy sources. These investments are vital for delivering a reliable and sustainable energy future.

GRE's Vice President and Chief Financial Officer, Michelle Strobel, explained, "We are entering a period of capital investment, but the end result will be a stronger grid and more reliable electric service. These investments are strategic and will result in lower costs over the long term."

As part of this strategy, GRE is increasing its 2025 wholesale rate by an average of 5.7% compared to the 2024 budgeted rate. This increase will strengthen GRE's financial position, enabling it to secure favorable funding terms and interest rates. Importantly, GRE operates as a not-for-profit cooperative, meaning all margins collected are ultimately returned to its members, including TWEC, over time as patronage.

While rate adjustments are always a challenge, it's worth noting that GRE's rates remain competitive compared to neighboring utilities and are well below the weighted regional cost of wholesale electricity.

Western Area Power Administration (WAPA)

Similarly, WAPA has announced rate changes for 2025. As a federal power provider, WAPA's rates are influenced by the costs of maintaining its hydroelectric facilities and transmission

systems. These changes are part of WAPA's commitment to providing reliable, affordable electricity to rural communities while maintaining its infrastructure.

What This Means for TWEC Members

These rate adjustments from GRE and WAPA will have a direct impact on TWEC's wholesale power costs, which make up a significant portion of our operating expenses. We are currently evaluating the extent of these changes and are working to minimize the impact on members.

At TWEC, we remain committed to providing you with safe, reliable, and affordable electricity. Our focus is on managing costs efficiently while ensuring that we have the infrastructure and resources to meet your energy needs now and in the future.

Looking Ahead

These investments by GRE and WAPA represent efforts to create a more robust and sustainable energy system. While rate increases are never welcome, they are necessary to maintain and enhance the reliability of the electric grid and support the transition to the mandated renewable energy sources.

We appreciate your understanding and patience as we navigate these changes. TWEC's mission remains unchanged: to serve our members with dedication to safe, affordable, and reliable service.

How the PCA Works

The PCA will be calculated based on your monthly kilowatt-hour (kWh) usage, meaning the dollar amount may fluctuate from month to month depending on your energy consumption. There are two components to the PCA:

- 1) Annual Rate Increases from GRE and WAPA: This portion of the PCA ensures that TWEC can cover the annual cost increases from our power suppliers.
- 2) Monthly PCA from GRE: This portion may be either a credit or a charge, depending on GRE's power purchase expenses and their need to pass on a monthly PCA. This dynamic adjustment reflects fluctuations in the cost of wholesale power on a month-by-month basis.

Why is the PCA Necessary?

The PCA allows TWEC to respond to changes in the cost of power supply without adjusting base rates, ensuring fairness and flexibility. By tying the PCA to actual usage and supplier costs, we can better align the cooperative's power expenses with revenue while maintaining financial stability for the cooperative.

More Information Coming in January

Members are encouraged to look for additional details about the PCA in the January edition of *Pine to Prairie*. The newsletter will include further explanations of how the PCA is calculated, examples of what members might expect on their bills. We'll also address frequently asked questions to ensure you have the information you need to understand this adjustment.

We understand that any additional charge can be a concern, and we are committed to transparency and member education. For more information about the rate increases from GRE and WAPA, please refer to this month's CEO Column or contact us directly with any questions.

2025 Scholarships



Scholarships are made available with unclaimed capital credits. After a period of seven years, Minnesota law allows cooperatives to use unclaimed capital credits for charitable or educational purposes.

Each year, Todd-Wadena is able to use the unclaimed capital credits to offer student scholarships in our service area. This year, we are offering up to four \$1,000 scholarships to graduating high school seniors, and up to two \$1,000 scholarships to adult students.

Graduating Senior Scholarship

Todd-Wadena Electric Cooperative will award up to (4) \$1,000 scholarships to local 2025 graduating seniors for their first year as a (freshman) college student.

Power Up Adult Student Scholarship

Todd-Wadena Electric Cooperative will award up to (2) \$1,000 Power Up Adult Scholarships to adult students who are headed to college for the first time, returning to complete an interrupted education, or looking to return to college to improve their career opportunities.

Using Your Space Heater Wisely



Electric space heaters can be a convenient heating supplement when used periodically to take the chill off a blustery day. However, they become increasingly ineffective for heating as the space gets larger. They can also be much more expensive to operate long-term as they are not eligible for lower, off-peak kWh pricing.

To estimate the cost of running a space heater we used the following formula:

 $Watts/1,000 \times Hours \times kWh rate = Usage Cost$


We wanted to know the cost of usage for one hour on high and our usage came to 1.5 kWh. When multiplied by TWEC's 11.672¢ rate per kilowatt-hour, we found it costs 17.5¢ per hour to run our heater on high.

DAILY $(1,500 \text{ watts/1,000}) \times 8 \text{ hours a day} \times 11.672 \text{ per kWh} = \1.40 **MONTHLY** $\$1.40 \times 30 \text{ days} = \42

Now we can see what impact a space heater is having on our monthly bill. In this example, a space heater that uses 1,500 watts and operates just 8 hours each day at 11.672¢ per kilowatt-hour costs \$1.40 per day to operate. And if you run it for 30 days, that would add \$42.00 to your monthly bill!

TWEC Board Minutes

Highlights from the October 31st, 2024, regular board meeting:

- CEO Dan Carlisle shared that Great River Energy (GRE) was a recipient of \$15 million of grid resilience funding He also gave an update from WAPA.
- The board approved several policy updates.
- Lisa Graba-Meech, CFO, presented the September financials to the board. Monthly kWh sales were 11 percent over budget. Energy revenue was 6 percent over budget. September's purchased power expense was 8 percent over budget. Tier is 2.05 and Equity is 40.9.
- The board approved a motion to reduce capital credit retirements by \$300,000, resulting in a total 2024 capital credit retirement equal to \$534,000 (GRE retirement: \$236,000; TWEC retirement: \$298,000).
- Member & Energy Services Manager Allison Frederickson noted how TWEC plans to participate in Wadena's parade of lights, serve as a toy drop off location for the Empty Stocking Program, and once again roll out its Meals 4 Members program this winter.
- Operations Manager Tyler Fisher reported how new construction continues to be down for the year, outages continue to be caused by vegetation, and crews are working on rebuilding the old copper distribution lines. The cooperative continues discussions with MnDOT on the relocation of distribution lines along the Highway 10 corridor.
- Director of Corporate Services, IT, & Cybersecurity Abby Harrison gave the Annual Cybersecurity Report. She spoke about the ever-changing aspects to cyber, including an increase in attacks, AI, and legislative matters.
- TWEC's Operation Round Up Board awarded nearly \$8,000 to area organizations.

First, make sure the problem is not on your side. (Members may be billed for service calls if the problem is caused by their own equipment.) Check fuses and circuit breakers in your home and by the meter pole. (Call us for help, if necessary.)

Second, check with your neighbors to see if they have power. Then call Todd-Wadena to report the problem. Give your name and account number. Then report any tree branches, twisted wires, broken poles, and whether or not your neighbors are also out of power.
